CARE Centre is in the second year of a three-year strategic plan, in accordance with our funding from the Ministry of Citizenship, Immigration and International Trade's (MCIIT) Labour Market Integration Unit, to which we report. CARE Centre also receives funding from the Government of Canada. This past year we saw the return of the Hon. Michael Chan as our Minister, a reappointment that hugely benefits our sector with his tremendous experience. The Hon. Dr. Eric Hoskins was also our previous MCIIT minister and is currently serving as Minister of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC). Dr. Hoskins spoke at a CARE Centre member celebration, and recognized the significant contributions IENs have made

The beginning of the fiscal year saw CARE Centre working closely with board committees to operationalize the second year of our three-year Strategic Plan, in consultation with our various communities. There were major activities and accomplishments over key action areas: the first annual Conference for IENs was held in November 2014, surpassing all expectations. A workplace transition and support program is now being piloted for delivery to both employers and IENs. Our application to the federal immigration department to fund PASS, Pre-arrival Supports and Services, has now entered a negotiations process. PASS will be a virtual program designed to shorten the time IENs spend from arrival to professional registration and employment. The great number of partner organizations who supported the application is a testament to more coordinated efforts effecting systemic change for IENs. We also consulted with several social enterprises in the caregiving and nursing sector to seek out further employment opportunities for our members.

Two of the biggest shifts affecting IENs were the move to the National Nursing Assessment Service (NNAS) in August 2014 and the adoption of the NCLEX RN exam in January 2015. While the NNAS offers IENs a centralized application process, provincial nursing regulations continue to pose challenges for our members. CARE Centre focused on the importance of language and communication and orientation to local context as essential success factors for IENs taking the Objective Structured Clinical Examination, or OSCE; as a result, both the College of Nurses of Ontario (CNO) and Touchstone Institute (which delivers the exam) now reinforce that message to IENs. With the strategic goals of enhancing our continuum of services to IENs while influencing change, CARE Centre undertook systemlevel mapping of Ontario's application process marking the pathways available to IENs - RN and RPN applicants to clarify issues and barriers. No access to university level education is one of the main barriers for IENs who are RN applicants, a major concern which has preoccupied us in this past year.

CARE Centre closely collaborated with the Ministry of Health and Long-term Care (MOHLTC) to promote the Nursing Career OrlENtation (NCO) Initiative, an extension of the Nurse Graduate Guarantee, which provides funding for IENs' first employment in Ontario. CARE Centre sits at the multi-stakeholders' table established by MOHLTC to further understand sector developments and challenges – we congratulate the Nursing Policy and Innovation Branch for the leadership they have shown and we look forward to more solution-focused dialogue.

In May 2014 we celebrated 216 members who passed their licensing exams, in conjunction with the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario's annual Career Expo. None of our successes would happen without our hugely dedicated staff and board members. My deep thanks to those who completed their tenure on the board this past year and a warm welcome all our new members. I am grateful for the acumen they bring to our organization. We also want to recognize our extraordinary member nurses, especially those who came together as volunteers to create and present the inaugural Conference for IENs. The conference was the occasion to present the annual CARE Centre Joan Lesmond IEN of the Year Award, which was sponsored by PRINTBRAIN. Starting in 2014 the recognition was bestowed on one RN and one RPN, as it will be going forward. CARE Centre once again owes a huge debt to the board committee headed by Ella Ferris, nursing leaders who always find time in their overloaded schedules to help us honour our deserving members. We thank them all once again.

November 2014 Conference for IENs Joan Lesmond IEN of the Year Award

The first annual Conference for IENs, organized by a volunteer committee of member IENs, friends in the community and staff, was a qualified success, pulling in room capacity registrations and a wide variety of exhibitors and featuring high-profile speakers, panelists and presenters. The conference opening night belonged to Tilda Shalof, a bestselling nurse-author who regaled the assembled with tales from the trenches. CARE Centre is grateful to opening speaker Josette Roussel from the Canadian Nurses Association and keynote the Hon. Jean Augustine, Fairness Commissioner. Another highlight of the full-day event was the luncheon presentation of CARE Centre's Joan Lesmond IEN of the Year Award, for the first year presented to one RN and RPN, members Ahmad Baki and Adela Belisario respectively. Corporate sponsor PRINTBRAIN's president Joshua Benezrah, who graciously funded the conference printing and the Joan Lesmond Award prizes, was on hand to present the awards to both deserving IENs. Conference media sponsors also deserve deepest thanks for all the lead-up coverage for the event.

PROGRAM UPDATES

^CCARE Centre gives you moral support; you feel they have your back. If you have questions, they have answers. CARE Centre's professionals have so much knowledge. The clinical workshops really help. We're all nurses, but practice can be quite different. Nursing is my passion. This is what I want to do.

INFORMATION SESSIONS AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In 2014-2015 the annual total of IENs attending information sessions was 484. CARE Centre continued to offer a group intake process so members can share their steps on the journey to registration while networking and pursuing professional development. IENs who meet the membership eligibility criteria (CNO letter of assessment, CLBA minimum score of 7 (per test) in speaking/reading/ writing/listening or equivalent and immigration status) are invited to complete a nursing readiness assessment and schedule a new members' orientation session. Following the orientation there is a professional development session. Some topics this past year covered HIV Disclosure and the Law, Maintaining Your Psychological Well-being and Wound Care. A total of 53 professional development sessions were held this past year, benefitting 603 members. Additionally, there were 127 registrants for CPR certification courses and 32 participants in CARE Centre's Competency Assessment Supplement workshops.

LANGUAGE AND COMMUNICATION FOR NURSES ONLINE LEARNING

CARE Centre's Language and Communications for Nurses program continued to be updated in 2014-2015 for off-site delivery and to help IENs prepare for the IENCAP clinical examination, known as the OSCE. The LCN program was also offered to IENs at Hamilton Health Sciences and the Chinese Professionals Association of Canada in Toronto. 198 IENs participated in 38 different LCN modules. Also beginning in the last fiscal year, LCN was being modified -

to be part of a new Workplace Transition Program being designed by CARE Centre for both employers and IENs. The LCN materials have been packaged as Essential Communication Strategies for Nurses. CARE Centre continued to encourage IENs to take the LCN Foundations online course for those who had not yet achieved CLBA level 7/7/7/7, and promoted enrollment in the CoursePark Learning Network, including the WHMIS and Standard Precautions courses for completion by Observational Job Shadowing participants. All CoursePark courses are recognized by the Canadian Nurses Association (as well as l'OIIQ in Quebec and the American Nurses Credentialing Center) for on-going professional development. A CELBAN Preparation and Orientation course was in development, to be offered in 2015. Bredin Community Centre for Learning in Alberta and Conestoga College in Ontario delivered CARE Centre's LCN curriculum to IENs.

EXAM PREPARATION AND REVIEW

CARE Centre's Exam Preparation and Review program underwent revision to reflect the national adoption of the RN NCLEX exam. In Ontario, RPNs currently continue to - take their CPNRE in-person. It is expected that the change to a computerized exam will occur by 2016. CARE Centre's Exam Preparation and Review course was delivered to classes including both RN and RPN candidates; core study material is relevant to exam content for both nursing designations. 128 member IENs enrolled this past fiscal year. The total number of IENs/members who passed the national registration exam in 2014 – 2015 was 157 (or 111% of the set target). Of those, 45 were RNs, 107 were RPNs and 5 member IENs passed both the RN and RPN exams within this past fiscal year.

EMPLOYMENT STRATEGIES FOR NURSES

There were a total of 111 participants. Employment Strategies for Nurses is a CARE Centre workshop for members who map their job search upon passing their exams and becoming registered to practice. The workshop highlights resumes and cover letters and includes mock interviews with volunteer stakeholders from employers and other nursing groups. CARE Centre is also promoting the course for participants who have applied to the Nursing Career OrlENtation matching gateway through HealthForceOntario. During this past fiscal year, a total of 112 IENs/members found nursing employment, 28 as RNs and 84 as RPNs, achieving 135% of CARE Centre's target. As a group, 31% found full-time employment, 45% parttime and 24% casual work. The nursing sectors employing member IENs included 49% in long-term care, 23% in hospitals, 11% in community home care, 9% in clinics, 2% in public health and 6% unstated (unknown).

OBSERVATIONAL JOB SHADOWING

The overall annual total of IENs participating in Observational Job Shadowing (OJS) placements was 60. The OJS placements are offered to members at any stage of their journey to registration, and members can enroll more than once. The placements this past year occurred in hospital settings, long-term care homes, in the community through home visiting nursing agencies and in community health centres. CARE Centre welcomed additional employer participants this year for a total of 26 active partners. OJS is an important opportunity for exposure to the Ontario healthcare workplace prior to newly registered members applying for funding through the MOHLTC's Nursing Career OrlENtation initiative, which gives employers financing to offer IENs their first nursing jobs. CARE Centre continues to be immensely grateful to the expert nurses who offer such outstanding examples of professional practice, and the nurse managers and educators who also offer support.

WORKPLACE TRANSITION PROGRAM

With the goal of improving recruitment and retention of IENs, CARE Centre has developed a new Workplace Transition Program (WTP). The focus of the program is to provide supports and resources for IENs and their employers in overcoming challenges during recruitment, orientation and transition/integration. Curricula and other elements of the program have been developed over the last fiscal, with piloting projects underway in 2015. The WTP components include: Facilitating IEN Talent Recruitment, Nursing Readiness Assessment Tool, Transition Support Package for IENs and Essential Communication Skills for Nurses.
