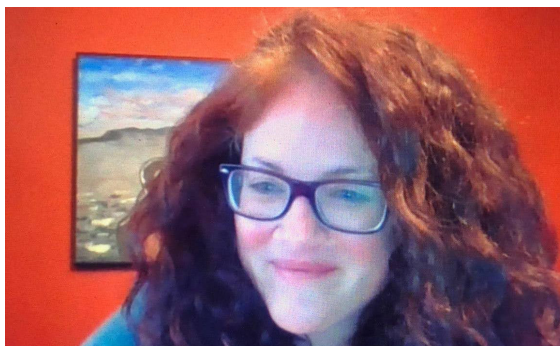

Over 5,000 nurses from more than 100 countries have accessed services and supports since the organization was founded in 2001. In-person services are provided in Toronto, Hamilton, Peel Region, London, Windsor and Kingston. On-line services across Ontario. In addition, we support IENs around the world as they prepare to come to Canada through our Pre-arrival Supports and

Services Program (PASS). CARE Centre is a not-for-profit professional organization funded by the Ontario Government and Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada. CARE Centre provides IENs with one-to-one case management, language and communication training, exam preparation, professional development, mentoring and networking to be successful in the nursing profession. CARE Centre recognizes the value of nurses with diverse education and experience and is committed to promoting their full contribution to the Canadian healthcare system.

Message from the Executive Director

Dr. Ruth Lee



By the time CARE Centre for Internationally Educated Nurses (CARE Centre) began a new year of operations on April 1, 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic had arrived in this country and our restricted reality set in. As Canada's most populated province, Ontario experienced the impact of the pandemic in significant

ways. Nurses were called to the frontlines as never before, often pausing their personal lives to care for others.

I am so proud to belong to the nursing profession. Nurses are going beyond their calling and their limits to ensure that Ontario's emergency response to COVID continues. Nurses have been called the backbone of the healthcare system, and they proved they are. The thousands of Internationally Educated Nurses (IENs) who became nurses in Ontario as CARE Centre members were among the ranks who stepped up to care for and protect others.

In the early days of the pandemic, sometimes Ontario nurses worked without adequate personal protective equipment. Nurses had to perform roles beyond their usual practice, serving as conduits for family communication with visitors prohibited in hospitals and seniors' homes. They were often the ones holding the hand of a loved one with a computer tablet in the other hand as a patient died from COVID-19.

I am so grateful to our outstanding CARE Centre staff who pivoted seamlessly to provide extra support to our member IENs, staying in close virtual contact. CARE Centre closed our offices in March of 2020, transferring our case management and other activities online. Our staff quickly adapted to "the new normal" and shared our nurses' determination to go the extra distance at work in the face of their own challenges during this time.

CARE Centre is celebrating our 20th anniversary in 2021, and one of the goals from our 2020-2023 Strategic Plan was to bring more programming online to be more widely available to our members. The COVID-19 pandemic put that transition into early adoption, and

as it appears that we will be responding to virus variants for some time to come, our new business model has been very effective. We'd like to thank Dr. Jean-Jacques Rousseau, Chair and our Board of Directors for their extra dedication to CARE Centre in guiding the necessary transitions.

Similarly, our partner organizations, consumed with their own operational challenges, have been a great support to CARE Centre and our member IENs. They value our members as we do, supporting them in their education, clinical experience, and employment. Our Observational Job Shadowing program evolved into Virtual Mentoring with employers, who reached out to offer jobs to our newly registered members and those awaiting licensure. WeRPN the Registered Practical Nurses Association of Ontario provided additional mentorship, pairing expert nurses with our member IENs, providing much needed insight in these exceptional times.

There were other achievements as CARE Centre worked online, with a series of podcasts recorded and almost 60 professional development workshops recreated for internet delivery.

Many nurse leaders will be participating in webinars and online events during our 20th anniversary year, and we thank everyone who will be contributing to our special programming. Part of these celebrations will be marking the 10th anniversary of the Joan Lesmond IEN of the Year Awards, which were suspended last year at the start of the pandemic. In the fall of 2021 we will hold a virtual graduation ceremony for two cohorts of our members who passed their exams and became registered to practice. Also to mark CARE Centre's 20th anniversary, we are grateful to the McLean Foundation for its generosity in donating free memberships to the first 100 clients who joined CARE Centre this year.

We know every nurse was worthy of praise and recognition in 2020-2021 for everything they did for all of us. As we move into the vaccination phase of the pandemic, we will continue to be indebted to all nurses, but want to particularly recognize our member IENs, for all the courage and determination they showed to re-establish their nursing careers in Canada, and how they shone when they were needed the most. They truly are the heroes.

Earlier this year, I invited former board chairs Amy Go and Saleem Hall to share their stories on how it all began. It is already 20 years since a small group received funding from the Maytree Foundation to find out why three quarters of internationally educated nurses (IENs) were

failing their Ontario registration exams. This research was followed by the creation of CARE Centre, the first bridge training program of its kind in Canada. It is a privilege for me to participate in the extension of a legacy that saw more than 5,000 nurses from over 100 countries improve the lives of Ontario patients, families, and communities.

The successes of CARE Centre were possible because of visionary founders including Amy and Saleem, dedicated staff including former Executive Director Zubeida Ramji, passionate volunteer board members including Lucia Yiu and Ella Ferris, and crucial funding from the Ontario and federal governments. I would like to express our gratitude to all those people who championed the cause of IENs for a more diverse, equitable and effective nursing profession in Ontario.

The last year is a particularly clear demonstration of the supportive nature of our networks. Like everyone else, we were hit hard by the current pandemic. We lost colleagues, family members and friends. Unable to work from our offices, the pre-COVID plan to develop virtual spaces to reach select clients quickly morphed into a full virtual-only approach.

Under the leadership of Executive Director Ruth Lee, we were able to completely change how we work to maintain our commitment to high-quality service to IENs. With the majority of eligible Canadians with a first dose of COVID-19 vaccine, the next few months are promising. The lessons from this pandemic will serve CARE Centre well regardless of how quickly or not our lives regain a sense of normalcy. The organization will outlive this crisis because we added value during the response to the pandemic; on-going thanks to the communities that support us.

We stand with IENs as professionals and also as people. 2020 challenged Canadians to acknowledge the disproportionate harm that discrimination visits on some groups. The painful legacies of racism (especially anti-Black, anti-Indigenous and anti-Asian racisms), sexism and colonialism harm us all when they harm our IENs, their families and their communities. The recent discovery of 215 Indigenous children buried in a mass, unmarked grave is an especially painful reminder of how far Canada is from where we need this country to be. Our hearts go out to the families and communities of these children. Even more recently, we suffered the ravages of Islamophobia. I want to live in a society where these kinds of harms are no longer possible. CARE Centre must continue to do its part by remaining an organization that lives out its values of respect, teamwork, accountability, professionalism, understanding, compassion, and diversity.

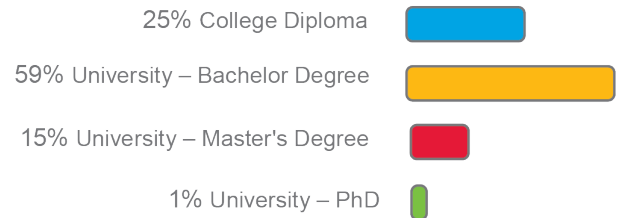

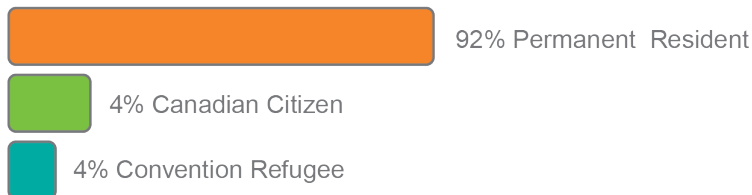
Immigration Class



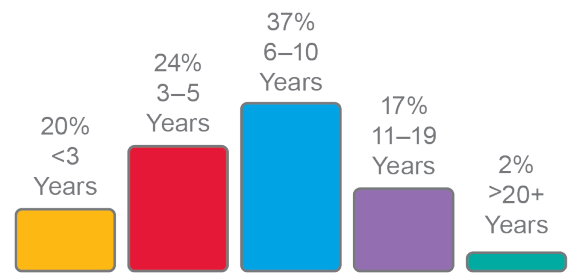
Level of Education in Country of Origin



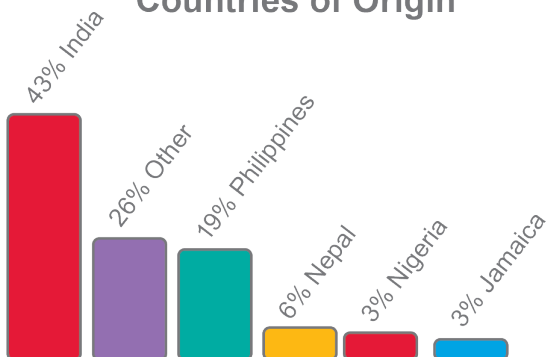
Immigration Status



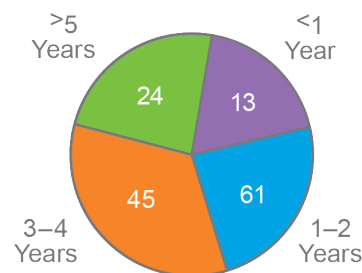
Nursing Experience in Country of Origin



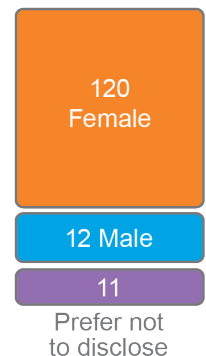
Countries of Origin



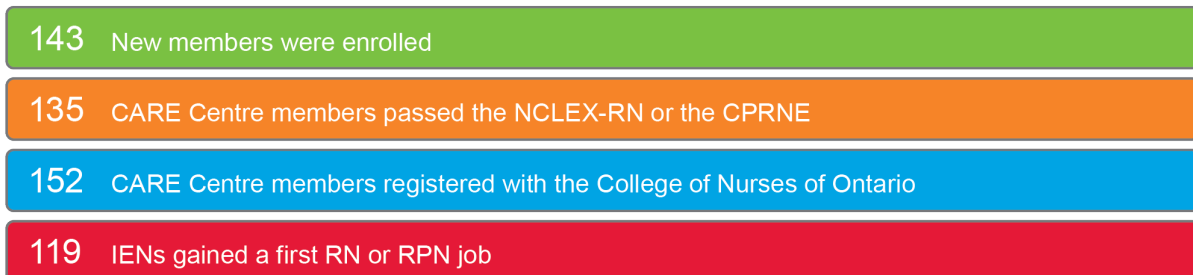
Length of Time in Canada

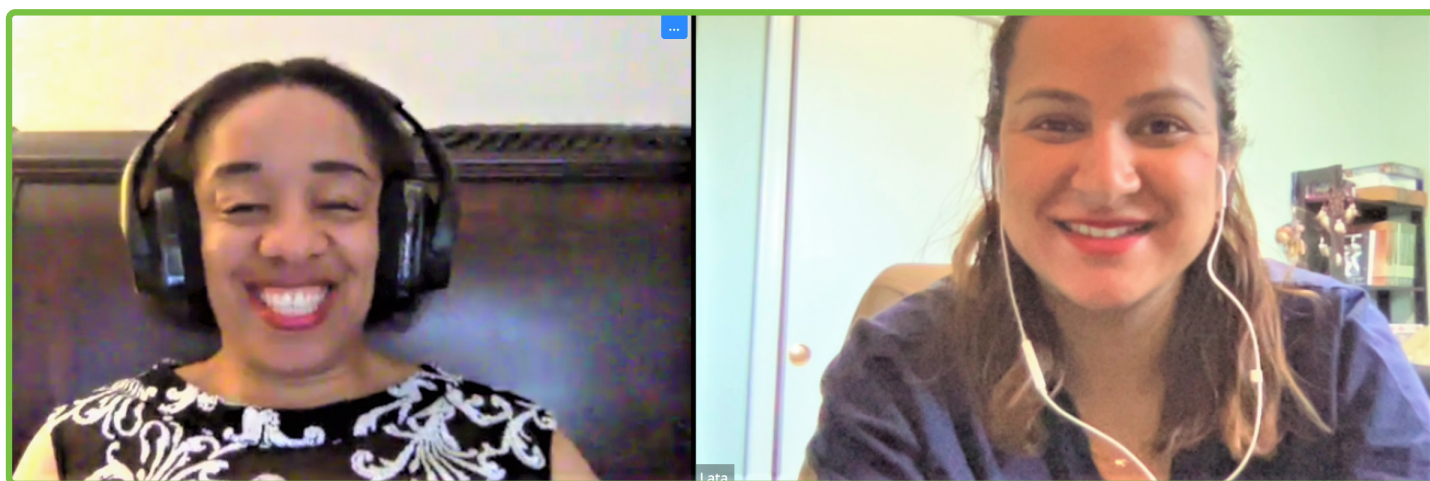

2021 Online



CARE Centre's STARS programs and services are centred around our case management model. STARS stands for Supports, Training, and Access to Regulated-employment Services, all guided by one-to-one interaction between member IENs and their case manager. Before COVID-19, meetings were held in-person at locations across southern Ontario from Windsor to Kingston, with virtual technologies used for clients living at greater distance. Email updates and phone call check-ins were also a main form of communication between clients and case managers.

Since the onset of the pandemic, all communication must be by email, phone, or video calling. CARE Centre uses Zoom or GoToMeeting for conferencing with larger groups. However, the intake

process and the achievement of milestones for our IENs continue as before. IENs begin their relationship with their case managers by taking an in-depth Nursing Readiness Assessment. The results help them develop a custom action plan to highlight strengths and to create a timetable to address areas for improvement.

Case managers are expert in collaboratively creating a customized plan for IENs to attain academic upgrading, skill development, College of Nurses of Ontario (CNO) registration and employment goals. Case managers also direct our members to additional learning resources such as CARE Centre's specialized nursing-focused language courses and professional development workshops (for now all in the virtual realm).

STARS Signature Courses

CARE Centre has developed and refined signature programming for member IENs to help them meet the College of Nurses of Ontario's (CNO) licensing requirements. During the COVID-19 pandemic, courses have moved to virtual delivery on our newly acquired CANVAS learning platform.

To ensure the best outcomes for registration exams, expert instructors deliver courses in Exam Preparation and Review for the Canadian Practical Nurse Registration Examination (CPNRE) for RPN candidates, and Internationally Educated Nurses Competency Assessment Program (IENCAP)/Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) Preparation for RN applicants.

CARE Centre is recognized as a leader in nursing-specific language training and offers all new clients the Institutional Canadian English Language Benchmark Assessment for Nurses (iCELBAN), a requirement of STARS membership. Case managers use iCELBAN results to assist IENs in developing individualized plans to improve overall language proficiency as they move toward registration. The iCELBAN was modified to an online version at the outset of the pandemic.

Other signature language courses include CELBAN Orientation and Preparation, Effective Communication Strategies for Nurses (ECSN), and an online offering of Nursing Communication Foundations (NCF). Course curricula are designed to enhance effective communication skills in the workplace, building confidence and preparing IENs for employment success.

Observational Job Shadowing and Virtual Mentoring



With the rise of the COVID-19 pandemic, CARE Centre's Observational Job Shadowing (OJS) program transitioned to Virtual Mentoring, with Expert Nurses from OJS partner organizations giving of their time in three to four online meetings a month with CARE Centre member nurses in one or two-hour sessions. CARE Centre is grateful to all those Expert Nurses who shared their expertise at a time when the healthcare system was under incredible strain, at times in crisis.

It's vital that IENs gain familiarity with the College of Nurses of Ontario (CNO) professional practice guidelines applied in the healthcare setting. Though our IENs couldn't be in healthcare workplaces or at the bedside shadowing the Expert Nurses, the mentors were able to answer questions on different nursing scenarios and helped IENs understand the scope of certain nursing specializations and their roles as RNs and RPNs within the setting. The Expert Nurses also gave guidance on employment readiness including resume critique, job interview techniques, and taking advantage of networking opportunities.

When OJS is done in person, as it will again be one day, the IENs are paired with the expert nurse through two or three shifts to give them insight into the role of nurses on various healthcare teams as well as their individual duties. Member IENs gain valuable exposure to the language and culture of the Canadian healthcare workplace. The past year's virtual mentorships have recreated that experience through professional sharing and storytelling. The IENs who completed a virtual mentoring with an Expert Nurse will be added to a priority list when facility placements commence.

CARE Centre members who meet OJS requirements can join the OJS program at any stage of their journey before and after registration and can apply for any number of individual placements in acute, long-term, community or other nursing environments. CARE Centre is grateful to the many healthcare employers who have participated in the OJS program in the years since its inception, as well as our newer partners who are also eager to offer opportunities to member IENs for workplace experience and employment.

Pre-Arrival Supports & Services (PASS)



The Pre-Arrival Supports and Services (PASS) program helps IENs in their countries of residence who are planning immigration to Canada, offering supports and services designed to shorten the time that IENs spend from arrival in Canada to nursing registration and employment. There is no cost to enroll in PASS, but IENs must have proof of graduation from a nursing school and a letter of immigration confirmation proving Permanent Residency status from the Government of Canada.

Since January 2016 to the beginning of the new fiscal year (April 1, 2021), PASS has served over 1074 IENs from 62 Countries. In the last fiscal year between April 2020 – March 2021, 132 IENs joined PASS and accessed online resources. While COVID-19 restrictions and inability to travel delayed PASS participants' arrival in Canada, it did allow them to spend more time in their country of current residence accessing the wide variety of PASS webinars and information available to them.

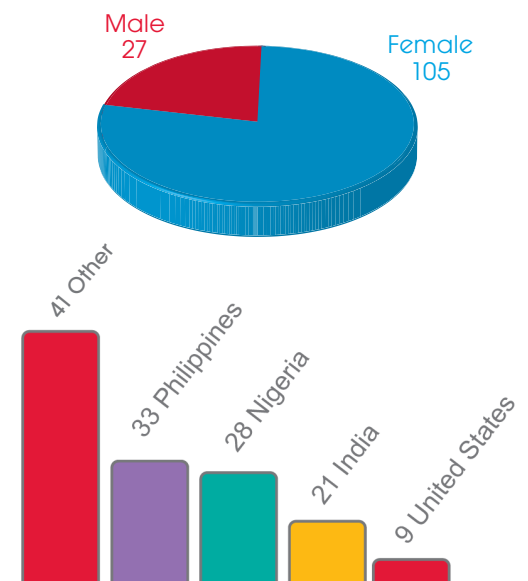

PASS program offerings continue to be enhanced with expanded and updated content. PASS clients receive:

- Individual case management for information and referrals for language, employment and settlement services prior to arrival in Canada
- Online courses providing nursing occupation-specific English language and communication training
- Live information and orientation webinars providing an overview of the nursing registration process and the Canadian healthcare system
- Live employment-related webinars equipping IENs for successful entry into the healthcare field
- Mentorship connection with Canadian Nurses Association Expert Nurses

CARE Centre at Conferences & Outreach Activities

Unique to the past year under pandemic restrictions, CARE Centre's outreach and educational activities all took place in the virtual realm. Webinars from CARE Centre and other service providers were held for staff and members on current topics such as Nursing During the COVID-19 Pandemic, Self Care During the Pandemic, Indigenous Health, Cannabis in Healthcare, Nursing in the North and Rural Regions, Palliative Care and Medical Assistance in Dying.

There were many additional meetings held with healthcare institutions eager to hire member IENs to help combat the COVID-19 pandemic. Management and staff met with a number of healthcare organizations such as Providence Health Care Kingston, William Osler Health System, Markham Stouffville Hospital, Cornwall Community Hospital, University Health Network, Unity Health, and many others.

CARE Centre key stakeholder meetings continued through 2020 and 2021 using digital communication, including sessions with the College of Nurses of Ontario, the National Nursing Assessment Service, the Ontario Long-Term Care Association and educational partners Ryerson University and Sheridan College, as well as settlement-sector organizations such as the YMCA and members of the Local Immigration Partnerships.

CARE Centre staff presented and participated in a number of virtual conferences this year. Executive Director Ruth Lee, staff leads, and case managers annually receive many invitations to share their expertise on the international, national, and provincial stage.

June 16, 2020 CARE Centre staff attended this professional development event for IRCC-funded service providers focussing on Settlement and Technology and Case Management for Vulnerable Clients.

July 23, 2020 Ruth Lee and Meghan Wankel presented on "Strategies in Successfully Integrating Internationally Educated Nurses into the Canadian Healthcare System" to an international audience.

Joan Lesmond IEN of the Year Awards

10th Anniversary

In 2011 CARE Centre celebrated its 10th anniversary with the launch of an annual awards program that would recognize an outstanding member IEN for their exceptional dedication to re-establishing their nursing career in Ontario. Sadly, that fall the nursing community lost the late Dr. Joan Lesmond, a champion of diversity and inclusion. CARE Centre named the awards program in her honour.

Joan's association with CARE Centre goes back to the beginnings of the organization when she served on the founding advisory committee. Originally from St. Lucia, Joan completed her nursing education in Ontario and New York, receiving her PhD from D'Youville College. Joan made a huge difference in her work

with many community and healthcare organizations. Saint Elizabeth Healthcare, the Registered Nurses Association and Hospice Palliative Care Ontario established annual scholarships in her name.

Since 2011, CARE Centre has recognized 15 member IENs of the Year. Loy Asheri, RN, from Tanzania, was the inaugural winner, followed by Ismail Assaad, RN, from Palestine (2012), and Edsel Mutia, RN, from the Philippines (2013). The award was expanded in 2014 to include one RN and one RPN. The winners in 2014 were Adela Belisario, RPN, from Peru, and Ahmad Jafarzadeh, RN, from Iran.

In 2015 the awards went to Rupali Krishna, RN, from India, and Alexis Lamsen, RPN, from the Philippines. In 2016 the recipients were Viral Pandya, RPN, from India, and Kareen Tacderas, RN, from the Philippines. 2017 saw Derrick Ntungwe, RPN, from Cameroon, and Gaynor Quieros, RN from the United Kingdom, take home the awards. In 2018 the award-winners were Novlette Delisser-Francis, RN from Jamaica, and Anna Ke, RPN from the Philippines.

In 2019 The Joan Lesmond IEN of the Year Award went to Gwendolyn Williams, RN, from Jamaica, and Belinda Lagria, RPN, from the Philippines. CARE Centre suspended the awards in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, when we joined everyone in saluting all nurses as frontline heroes. We're excited to relaunch the Joan Lesmond IEN of the Year Awards for our 20th anniversary in 2021, once again honouring one member RN and one RPN who emulate Joan's passion and commitment. The virtual presentations will take place on September 16th.

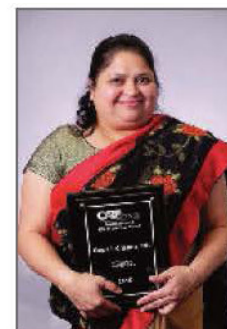
